Further, each of the six undergraduate colleges at UCSD requires their students to complete a writing program. • All students must complete three courses from the lower-division TWS series, TWS 21-16. Two of the three courses may be substituted with MMW4 and MMW5 for Eleanor Roosevelt College students. • All student writing is evaluated by faculty/teaching staff and responded to with detailed comments to optimize student's learning progress. • Most upper division courses require student participation in discussions and activities in order to improve communication skills and build a community of scholars within each class and the broader cohort of majors. • Majors are encouraged to study abroad in one of the UC Education Abroad Program's many affiliated international universities. Up to six classes taken abroad can be applied to the Third World Studies major. 	 Every course offering is evaluated and approved by the campus Committee on Educational Policies and Courses (CEP). Every course is evaluated by students employing the campuswide Course and Professor Evaluation (CAPE) survey. On a wider level, many Third World Studies majors go on to graduate and professional schools, emphasizing the quality of the Program's outcomes. The process of evaluating our response to questions of outcomes and assessment has led us to modify the catalogue description of our program.
